While the actual cost of this trip is \$373 (see details below) the troop committee leadership has voted to subsidize \$53 per scout from the unit's general fund, therefore the charge is \$320 per Scout (plus special merit badge fees).

### Be Prepared.....For Summer Camp

Troop 726 - Summer camp is coming! For most boys summer camp is the best scouting week of the year. To make the most of it scouts need to live the motto and Be Prepared. How you might ask?

Be Prepared in your grooming - A scout is clean - look good in your clean uniform with all the patches on and in the right place and with your hands and face clean with clipped fingernails

**Be Prepared in your packing** - Overnight temperatures will be in the 40's and the daytime temperatures could touch the 90's. Thunderstorms are a possibility

Be Prepared for your merit badges - The 35 scouts attending camp have signed up for 197 merit badges, 120 of which need prerequisites completed before camp to avoid partials. Speaking of partials, there are 18 partials which can be cleared up at summer camp if the scouts complete as much as they can at home and finish off the rest during free time at camp. In addition to all that, there are 37 merit badge fees to be collected.

Be Prepared for advancement - bring or request whatever supplies you need to complete your skills at camp - rope, US flag, first aid materials, lightweight stoves, etc. I will be available for Scoutmaster conferences at camp.

Be Prepared to teach - older scouts be ready to show scout spirit and teach skills to the younger scout who will be SPL when you are a sophomore in college

Be Prepared with your paperwork - A scout is courteous. Please arrange to have all release forms signed, complete medical forms turned in, camp payments made, and Troop dues brought to current.

Be Prepared to take aim - At camp we will hit the target in Archery, Rifle Shooting, Shotgun Shooting, black powder, tomahawk throwing, and in the shower house. We will likely be the only Troop using the facilities at our end of camp. As adults we are doing a lot of work to have a fun and productive camp and we aim to please. As scouts in the shower house, will you aim too, please.

Be Prepared for fun - Shooting, cycling, hiking, swimming, boating, fishing, climbing, mountain boarding, and many other activities await. The more of your merit badge program you complete in advance, the more fun you will have at camp.

Troop 726 had a Rifling event at **Chabot Gun Club** on April 13. Scouts got most of the requirements done for the rifle merit badge. .










# Model Airplane Contest – April 20 By Scout in Charge: Kyle Avery





# WHY DOES A BOY SCOUT CARRY A STAFF?


Why does a Boy Scout carry a staff? is a question that is often asked by people who do not know the many uses to which this useful article can be put. The illustrations given below show several different ways in which the staff will prove a handy and valuable article, essential to the Scout's outfit.



The staff is very useful for beating out brush fires and outbreaks that occur in open fields.



Wading a stream, Two or three Scouts grasp the staff like this.



Both patrol tents and tepees can be made with the aid of the staff.



An improvised stretcher of coats and staffs



A line of Scouts linked together on a night hike



To stop an aggressive dog, hold the staff crosswipe in front of you and toward the animal, as shown above.





When someone falls through ice, throw him your staff so he can grasp it like this until you can get a rope and pull him out.



When climbing gates, you can give yourself a push up with your staff.



For erecting a flagstaff and forming a fence, the staff is very useful.



As a tripod for cooking, and also as a seat, the staff is handy in camp.



A clear view can be had by looking through a small hole drilled in the staff.

### FURTHER USES OF THE STAFF

Recovering objects floating in the water

Jumping ditches

Measuring distances Rope ladders Feeling the way over marshy ground Making rafts Self-defense Levering up logs and stones Bridge buildling Making splints

#### Cimbing a Mountain-


Carry the staff crosswise, and if you slip lean inward upon it again at the side of the mountain. The weight of your body will drive the end of the staff into the earth, and to anchor you.

#### Important Notice

Scours are strongly urged to obtain their own inclinidual staffs of matural wood. These will be found much more serviceable than the ordinary factory made article.

#### Factory-Made Staffs (Only)

For the convenience of Scouts who are unable to obtain cutural staffs, the Supply Group sells staffs of finished wood.
